The Wolf Academy Historic Site is the heart of public education in Pennsylvania. It is here that George Wolf attended school and later taught, laying the foundation that resulted in his becoming the seventh Governor of Pennsylvania and the state's "Father of Public Education." With this heritage in mind, the Governor Wolf Historical Society is offering "make it and take it" handson classes of 18th and 19th century Colonial Arts presented by talented artisans. Many of the instructors have taught at Landis Valley, Historic Bethlehem, Lancaster Mennonite Historical Society (now Mennonite Life) and other locations. Classes will be held in the GWHS historic buildings and on the grounds. Lunch will be provided by members of the society. Classes are limited and registration must be submitted by May 30. Grain (Fancy) Paint a Mirror and Bunfooted Box

Instructor Jim King has been teaching false graining for 10 years. He has a BA degree in art.

Learn the folk art of false graining or fancy painting using acrylic glazes. In the manner of 18th century Pennsylvania German folk artists, we will experiment using combs, cut cardboard and fingers to decorate softwood Pennsylvania German reproductions, a 10" x 10" mirror and a 7" x 5" x 4" bunfoot box. Experience not necessary. Materials fee \$65. Maximum 10 students.



Transfer & Color Embroidery

Instructor Jo Evans has embroidered since she was a young child and has over 20 years of teaching experience. She has completed various embroidery stitches on multiple pieces.

Students will be shown how to stencil designs and choose colored floss to blend. Ttowels will be provided to learn stitches. Jo teaches embroidery as a fun, relaxing art. Materials fee \$10. Maximum 5 students.

In Memoriam: President Terri Sayago

Gov. Wolf Historical Society President Teresa A. Sayago died on April 4 after a brief illness. Elected President last December, Terri planned a busy and varied program of events for 2023. It will be a challenge to continue her vision for the Society.

Terri's involvement with GWHS began in 2019 when she and her husband Brian offered to include their home in the 2019 Christmas House Tour. She joined the Board of Directors in 2021 and made an immediate impact with her enthusiasm, dedication, and organizational skills. She could be counted on to volunteer to help with events and programs.

Due to COVID restrictions, the Society was facing a financial deficit. Terri pursued grant opportunities that significantly improved our

balance sheet.

She introduced me to the GWHS when I attended my first program. For that I will be forever grateful. — Jackie Sellers When Terri identified a project to improve our buildings, she deftly and efficiently organized Society members to tackle the project. For example, noticing that the wooden floors of the Academy and Monocacy meeting room needed refinishing, she researched options, ordered supplies, laid out a work

plan, organized work teams and directed the project from start to successful conclusion.

The Society was not Terri's first civic involvement. Terri taught English at Easton Area High School for 30 years. After retiring, she joined the Board of the Memorial Library of Nazareth and Vicinity, where she held the positions of president, vice-president and secretary

Caramel Pear Bites

One of Terri's plans for 2023 was to use the fruit from our pear trees in the Herb and Pleasure Garden to make a special pear treat. In tribute to Terri, here is her recipe.

1/2 sheet frozen puff pastry, thawed

1 ½ cup diced pears in 1 T. lemon juice

2 T. sugar

1/4 tsp. each ginger and cinnamon

Chopped pecans

10 caramels

3 T. heavy cream

Sea salt flakes

Preheat oven to 400 degrees. On a lightly floured surface roll unfolded pastry into a 15"x 10" rectangle. Cut into 24 2 1/2 inch squares. Fit each square into a 1 ¾ inch muffin pan.

Stir pears, lemon juice, sugar, and spices. Spoon into the pastry-lined muffin tins. Sprinkle with pecans. Bake 15 minutes until pastry is golden.

Cool 5 minutes and remove from pans.

Heat and stir caramels and cream over low heat until melted. Drizzle over each Pear Bite and then sprinkle lightly with salt flakes. Serve immediately. Makes 24.

Friday, June 9, 8:30 a.m. - Noon **Blacksmithing Basics**

Instructor Dave Mowen learned blacksmithing at Landis Valley. He will be assisted by other society members including Robert Swan and George Wilhelm.

Shaping steel with heat and a hammer is fascinatingly like pushing around putty or clay. Iron starts



out very hard, but with a bit of heat, it becomes plastic, to be flattened or stretched, twisted and bent into something needed. To make the created form useful, just let it cool back down and you have a very strong tool or utensil. In this introduction, each student will try the various processes the blacksmith uses to make things, and then go home with a practical and useful creation. Learn how to make a meat hook, a rat-tail, and maybe a twist on a portable forge, learning the basic "pushing metal around" and perhaps even "welding". Students are advised to wear a long sleeved shirt, jeans and shoes. Materials fee \$20. Maximum 8 students.

Rustic Fruit Bowl

In Search of 1816 Bath Map

Carol Bear is searching for the 1816 town lots map of PA. It was drawn by James Ralston. Asa McIlhaney about it in his 1901 book Bath and Its Environs, and sa has a copy. The early Bath deeds in the Easton courtly refer to the town lots by number. The Bath Museum ha of the town lot paper receipts. The History of Northan County, 1877, states on p. 225 "In 1816, Bath was laid of a village by James Ralston." Sometimes he is referred Col. Ralston. She has been in search a factor. 1902 Monocacy School Students



This 1902 photograph, donated to the Society by Linda Flory, is our oldest photo of any East Allen school. The students and teacher are from the one-room Monocacy School at Jacksonville and School roads. It shows the teacher, T. A. Fehnel, and 31 students in grades 1 thru 8 in front of the Allen Township Academy (now known as the Wolf Academy). As best as can be determined, the left sign reads: Monocacy School / Oct. 12 1902 / T. A. Fehnel / Teacher, and the right sign: Sev[enth] Gov[ernor] Wolf / Educated / Here.

Academy and School

The 1867 Monocacy School was built a couple hundred feet from the 1785 Wolf Academy, where George Wolf was a student and later a teacher. Wolf went on to become the seventh governor of Pennsylvania, 1829-1835, and is best known for signing the 1834 law establishing a system of free public education in the state; he is called the Father of Public Education in Pennsylvania.

After serving as an educational institution, the Academy was converted into a Presbyterian Church. In 1873, the building was sold to farmer Isaac Insley and was used as a barn and for storage. As evidenced in the photo, the building suffered from a lack of maintenance. It is interesting that the class photo was taken in front of the Academy instead of the well maintained brick Monocacy School which the students attended.

The photo has some very unusual aspects, because at this time, photos were very formal. The teacher is wearing a sweater, not a suit. Three boys are holding baseball bats (two boys are jointly holding a bat). In contrast, the nicely groomed girls, especially the older ones, are probably wearing their best clothing.

Teacher Fehnel

Teacher Thomas Alfred Fehnel was born in Moore Township in 1873. He married Alice Mary Schaeffer about 1894 and they had 3 children who died young in 1896, 1901, and Sept. 19, 1902, less than a month before the photo was taken. After teaching in rural county schools, in 1908 Fehnel became a letter carrier and postal clerk in Catasauqua for 30 years. He died in 1939 and is buried at the Fairview Cemetery in Mooretown.

Digital Enhancement

The wording on the two signs that the students are holding was not legible on the print. Bob Bysher used his technical skills and digitally enhanced the image so that we could read the signs. He also used several software programs to enhance the students faces

50 Years Ago

To help pay for exterior restoration of the Academy, the Wolf Academy Restoration Society purchased 720 commemorative blue plates for \$645. The Society sold them for \$3.50 each. The Society still has some of these plates and uses them for dinner events.
